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### **Pastor's Report to Charge Conference**

Every so often I take the time to read through one of the Gospels in its entirety. Feeling somewhat discouraged about the world's situation recently I read Mark. Every time I read I learn something new. This time what stood out for me was that Jesus never seemed to be discouraged or feel that he was fighting a losing battle. It was as if his motivation, his mission, and his loyalty, was rooted not in the things he did or the way people responded to him, but in his faith that all things were ultimately in the hands of God. So no matter what, he knew what he was called to do and who he was called to be. His life was lived as a part of that Kingdom of heaven.

We live in a time when it is easy to become discouraged. Wars seem to continue without end and the helpless suffer the most.
