Pastor's Page All Saints Day Traditions – Old and New

Summer is changing to fall in Simsbury. The smell of wood smoke is in the air, pumpkins are out on doorsteps, and the leaves are slowly going through their costume changes of red to yellow to brown from brilliant green. Days by the pool have been replaced with flannel, warm drinks, and thoughts of Halloween costumes. For nearly a decade Erin and I have taken that opportunity to dress up pretty seriously, and for the last number of years we've hosted a party for our friends to bring their kids, get dressed up, eat some good food and have some fun. I won't spoil it for this year, but the last couple of years have included an old school Ventriloquist and Dummy, the Dude and Maude, and Bob Ross and a Happy Tree. All of this is in good fun, and while I hope you have your own fall traditions I also hope that we don't lose sight of the day that follows: All Saints Day.

Celebrated in nearly all corners of Christianity, All Saints is intended to remind us of the deep links between the Church Militant (those who are alive) and the Church Triumphant (those who are deceased). Customs vary across traditions and cultures, but many involve the lighting of candles and the remembering of the Saints who've gone before us. Often those customs involve a simple service and the recitation of names from those who have passed in the last year but not always. Sometimes they're more elaborate and can encompass many more people.

The tradition at Simsbury United Methodist has been to light candles, ring a bell, and read the names of folks who have passed into the Church Triumphant over the past year. It is a beautiful and moving tribute to those people who we've loved and lost, those who have been inspirations to us, and sometime those that we truthfully didn't know that well. I'm so excited that you've been doing this already, and I look forward to continuing that tradition this year while also expanding our worship experience.

At my previous church we celebrated the lives of those who passed in the last year, and we also encouraged the congregation to remember people who were significant in their lives by allowing each person to light a candle on the altar. This year at Simsbury we will do the same thing for each three services. While the bulletin or PowerPoint will list the names of the recently deceased, during the service and after receiving Communion, each person will have the chance to approach the altar and light a candle in memory of whomever they choose. At the service's conclusion we should have an altar ablaze (not really) with candlelight representing those dear to us who are no longer with us. It is a truly moving sight, and I hope that it will have as powerful impact on you as it has on me over the years.

Additionally, I want to encourage you to bring in an item that represents the person you will be recognizing this year to display on a table in Wesley Hall during Coffee Hour. Having an artifact or memento to show provides another opportunity to remember that Saint who is important to you. It shouldn't be a large item, nor should it be valuable, but it should represent who that person was whether it's a picture or something else entirely.

One of my favorite parts of my job is hearing your stories about loved ones, adventures, and how you came to be you. All Saints Sunday is a wonderful way for us both to learn more about each other, and I hope and pray that you will participate fully.

A Prayer Shawl is knitted or crocheted covering for the legs or shoulders. Its generous size is intended to allow a recipient to feel surrounded by comfort and warmth. The shawl is usually worked up in a pattern of three stitches meant to signify the Trinity of Father, Son, and Holy Ghost. The finished shawls are given to the church for the pastor to bless and deliver to people who are undergoing personal struggles. The prayer shawl reminds us of the gift of grace that God has wrapped around each of us during good times and bad.

On the evening of **December 6**, the Chancel Ringers will perform a special **Christmas Bell Concert** at the Simsbury Library. Please come and support the group and listen to some great holiday bell music!

On Sunday, **December 9**, at 4:00 p.m., SUMC will host a "**Messiah Sing**" to celebrate the Christmas season. George Frederic Handel's "Messiah" was first performed in 1742 in Dublin and has since become one of the best known and most frequently performed choral works in classical western music. The SUMC Chancel Choir will be joined with other area church choirs for this performance, and will also feature Kari Miller on the organ and professional vocal soloists. Christ the King Sunday is November 25

The United Methodist Church celebrates the special days of the Christmas season (Advent, Christmas, Epiphany) and the Easter season (Lent, Easter, Pentecost) as well as special Christian days that fall during what is known as Ordinary Time. These include All Saints Day and Christ the King Sunday.

What is Christ the King Sunday, and why do we celebrate it?

The Festival of Christ the King is both the Last Sunday After Pentecost and the last Sunday of the Christian Year. It is not so much a climax in itself, however, as it is a transitional Sunday leading directly to Advent, the Christmas cycle, and the new Christian Year. People are already thinking about Christmas, and the observance of Christ the King can help them prepare by stressing the continuity between the celebration of kingship, or sovereignty, of Christ and the expectation of Christ's coming again in sovereign glory which opens the Advent Season. We have more than a baby Jesus at Christmas; we have a sovereign Christ. "Joy to the world! The Lord is come: Let earth receive her King."
